

June 1 Marked the Start of the 2017 Hurricane Season



The National Hurricane Center forecast calls for 11–17 named storms and hurricanes this year. Now is the time to take the steps necessary to protect your family and yourself. It takes just one hurricane to destroy a community. KCER urges you to take time *now* to make your disaster plan and to build an emergency kit.

The projected storm forecast will be updated in early August, right before the peak of the hurricane season, which runs until November 30, 2017.

CMS Emergency Preparedness Final Rule Interpretive Guidelines

Last year, on September 16, 2016, the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) published the final rule on Emergency Preparedness Requirements for Medicare and Medicaid Participating Providers and Suppliers. The rule, which affects all 17 provider and supplier types, became effective on November 15, 2016. All participating providers must comply with the regulations by November 15, 2017. Poll Shows Natural Disasters Are Still the Number One Fear for Americans

A new poll, conducted by international polling firm YouGov for Healthcare Ready, shows that Americans still fear natural disasters more than terrorist attacks, cyber-attacks, or environmental disasters, but that they are not prepared to deal with one. Additionally, when asked who holds the most responsibility for preparing a community for a natural disaster or disease outbreak, most survey participants failed to recognize the preparatory services provided by national and local non-profit relief organizations.



The summer travel season is heating up. If you and your family are traveling anywhere where mosquitos love to be, make sure you take steps to protect yourselves from mosquito-borne viruses like Zika. Pack the insect repellent and use it—liberally! Using insect repellent is the best way to prevent diseases like Zika.



The most common symptoms of Zika virus are fever, rash, joint pain, and/or red eyes. See your healthcare provider if you develop these symptoms while travelling.
